


18th September – Culture Night

GENEVA TRIP – ONE YEAR ON

In October 2019 volunteers Joe, Bertie, Teresa, Tony, Aoife and Jim (from left to right below) went on a trip to Geneva to witness the negotiations at the 5th Session for a UN Treaty on Business and Human Rights.

A year later, here is what they say.



Tony Devlin: The trip to Geneva was quite an inspirational experience, not only for the comradeship with the other Volunteers but for the contacts we made with so many civil society groups doing so much good work. Back in Ireland I've been able to engage with politicians in my constituency (Dublin West) and to spread the message about the importance of the Treaty with an interview on local Radio (Phoenix FM) and by bringing the Massive Clearance installation to Blanchardstown Parish Centre. In May, I was able to deliver a series of six Zoom talks to people here in Blanchardstown, based on a communal reading of Pope Francis' Encyclical *Laudato Si'* and emphasising the close connection between what happens to the planet and what happens to the poor and the marginalised. I'm impatient now for the day when COVID restrictions are eased and a cherished plan to bring the exhibition *Faces of Resistance* here can be implemented.

GENEVA TRIP – ONE YEAR ON

Teresa Hill: Since returning from Geneva I have volunteered at events highlighting the issues faced by human rights and environmental defenders during the NI Human Rights festival and in Stormont with Bertha Cáceres. I have spoken to my elected representatives about the need for effective legislation for corporations. As part of my Masters, I carried out some research into human rights due diligence legislation in Northern Ireland. I am pleased that Ireland is more engaged with the negotiations this year and I hope that alongside other nations, Ireland will come out in favour of the UN Treaty.



Bertie O'hAinmhire: I believe that Ireland is in a unique position within the EU and at UN level to show strong leadership, we have to stand up for strong environmental standards and human rights. I have been in contact in the meantime with politicians and leaders in Ireland encouraging increased engagement of Ireland in this process. Through social media in particular I have endeavoured to highlight the growing repression and violence being faced by communities and individuals who are trying to stop corporate developments that negatively impact on their community. *Tá an rás seo do acmhainní nádúrtha ag cur na milliún i mbaol, caithfear deireadh a chur leis an ciapadh agus an imeaglú atá ag tarlú go laethúil.*

Joe Murphy: I wrote to a number of TDs seeking support for the treaty and met an Independent TD in her office in Galway. Clearly she understood the importance of the treaty and was very supportive of it. I think that some TDs who didn't respond to me may not be as interested in what they may see as 'international politics'. I feel that because Galway is so reliant on multi-national businesses there may be a reluctance to get involved in what may be wrongly seen as restrictions on business (with developing countries). Overall, I got a strong sense from my engagement with the public that people understand the need for the treaty and support it. I am enthused by countries such as France which has implemented legislation to discourage the abuse of human rights in developing countries.

On behalf of Al-Haq, I am pleased to share that our organization has been chosen to receive the 2020 Gwynne Skinner Human Rights Award from the International Corporate Accountability Roundtable (ICAR) along with co-laureate, Ms. Alejandra Gonza from Global Rights Advocacy. The award recognizes individuals and organizations for their significant contributions to corporate accountability. I would like to take this opportunity to extend my gratitude for your support to Al-Haq and faithful commitment to defending human rights in the Occupied Palestinian Territory (OPT) in the face of political pressure and campaigns of intimidation that seek to legitimize occupation and oppression.

Al-Haq's work in the area of business and human rights is a result of decades of colonial policies implemented by Israel, the Occupying Power, in violation of international humanitarian law. Our work targets duty bearers and stakeholders for advocacy and accountability on issues related to business and human rights. Not least of this work has been relentlessly advocating for the release of the UN Database of businesses operating in the OPT, as mandated by the United Nations Human Rights Council in 2016, until its eventual release in February of this year. Al-Haq will continue to advocate for annual updates to the database, as provided by the mandate. In addition, Al-Haq will continue the pursuit of accountability of corporations and corporate actors for their complicity in the continuation of rights violations in the OPT.

Over the past few years, our partners have supported this work through funding, calls to action, direct advocacy with third State duty bearers, and institutional support. This award belongs to all of us who work to realize the rights of Palestinians in the OPT. Even more than the award itself, we celebrate the recognition by human rights defenders and civil society organizations of the Palestinian people's legitimate call for accountability under international law. For your invaluable contribution to this steady shift in discourse, I thank you and I look forward to continuing our pursuit of justice together.

FRATELLI TUTTI

Of the Holy Father Francis
On fraternity and social friendship

Last Sunday Pope Francis signed his latest encyclical after celebrating mass at the Basilica of St. Francis of Assisi. [Fratelli Tutti](#) is a letter addressed to all people, which focuses on human connectedness and social friendship, all of which resonate strongly with much of Trócaire's work overseas and in Ireland.

It is also a significant global response to Coronavirus. Indeed, Pope Francis' weekly audiences have focused on themes linked to the pandemic and have offered hope and a way forward, not just for Catholics, but for everyone.

As the agency of the Catholic Church in Ireland working on justice and human rights, we particularly welcome the Pope's thought-provoking guidance on subjects including universal human rights, conflict, the treatment of refugees and migrants, the rights of indigenous people and the need to actively pursue a 'better' form of politics. These are areas that Trócaire has worked on for many years and this encyclical provides further validation of that work.

We leave you with these inspirational words from Fratelli Tutti:

“It is my desire that, in this our time, by acknowledging the dignity of each human person, we can contribute to the rebirth of a universal aspiration to fraternity. Fraternity between all men and women.[...] we need a community that supports and helps us, in which we can help one another to keep looking ahead.”

International Day for the Eradication of Poverty

Since the 17th October 1987, people of all backgrounds, beliefs and social origins have gathered every year on October 17th to renew their commitment and show their solidarity with the poor.

Trócaire was initially established in 1973 to protect and respond to the basic rights of those in need while simultaneously tackling the critical question of why these people are poor and oppressed and challenging the structural issues that result in their poverty and inequality.

Trócaire understands poverty as being more than the absence of basic needs. It is the absence of opportunity, a lack of power, a lack of voice, and a lack of control over one's own destiny. To tackle poverty is to address the additional factors that perpetuate the cycle of poverty.

Trócaire believes that one such factor that lies at the heart of poverty is an imbalance of power. When those in power disregard and disrespect the fundamental human rights and dignity of each individual and fail to act for the common good, access to and use of resources become more and more inequitable, and the poverty cycle is thus perpetuated. Global wealth is becoming increasingly concentrated among a minority elite. Therefore, Trócaire has a major commitment to addressing this imbalance of power by supporting the empowerment of women and men, to challenge these unjust power structures and to claim their inalienable rights.

For Trócaire, the key factors in today's context which keep women and men in poverty are:

- A lack of access to, control over and protection of resources, particularly land and water: globally one in nine are hungry, with insufficient access to land, water, inputs and training, many of them smallholder farmers and particularly women.
- Inequality, in particular gender inequality: women and girls continue to experience multiple forms of discrimination, resulting in the most significant burden of poverty and vulnerability. Therefore, Trócaire strives to support small female enterprise in developing countries.
- Humanitarian crises: exacerbated by political factors and climate change, denying people access to basic needs and protection in times of crises. These factors flourish in a context of poor governance and disregard for human rights.



